<u>Kabalebo Nature Resort</u> Birding 23 – 25 Januari 2020

During the 3-day birding tour we encountered a little challenge and that was due to the low water in the Kabalebo river, our options were limited. Either go upstream until we have reached Kron Sula or go downstream a little bit further from Kilo 3. And since we also experienced extreme hot weather conditions, we combined the boat trips with early morning hikes.

Morning Hikes:

- Area near the lodge/airstrip:

The area surrounding the lodge was a great place to start. It was an open spot and the pace was moderate. We started a little bit before breakfast, **Smooth-billed Ani's** greeted us every morning and the **Plain-crowned Spinetail** was one that was playing hide and seek with us. Flycatchers were well represented by the **Great Kiskadee**, the **Lesser Kiskadee** and the always present **Rusty-margined**

Flycatcher. The moment the sun started to show up, so did most of the birds. **Scarlet macaws**, **Red-and-Green Macaws** and even the **Blue-and-Yellow Macaws** were flying over our heads. No scope needed as they were flying over very low. A bit further from the lodges we heard a **Lineated Woodpecker** announcing his territory and on the same tree we spotted some nesting **Blue-headed Parrots**. The Suite garden was filled with nests of the **Common Tody-flycatcher** and right near the pineapple plants we noticed a small group of **Yellow-bellied Seedeaters**. They are migrant birds and they announced their arrival too.

We stayed near a blossoming Monkey Brush Vine and a tree full of small seed pods. Our patience was rewarded as we were greeted by the **Crimson Topaz**, the **Grey-breasted Sabrewing**, the **Fork-tailed Woodnymph** and the **White-chinned Sapphire**. The tree with the seed pods was like a little restaurant; **Silver-beaked Tanagers**, **Palm Tanagers** and the **Blue-gray tanagers** were all filling their little stomach and from time to time we even spotted a couple of **Yellow-crowned Tyrannulets**.

Right before we headed back to the lodge for breakfast, we noticed a **Blue Dacnis** joining the others and so did the **Dusky-capped Flycatcher**.

Morning Hikes:

- River cabin and River cabin trail

Mornings are the best when it comes to birding by foot. The sun is not yet excruciating hot and most of the animals just started their day. On the trail heading to the River Cabin we heard the **White bearded manakin**. A couple of minutes later we were able to see the **Amazonian Antshrike** and the **White-browed Antbird** at the same spot. **Black Curassows** were seen resting between the dense vegetation. We also managed to see the **Tropical Gnatcatcher** and the **Green-tailed Jacamar**. Soaring above we spotted the **Plumbeous Kite**, the **White hawk** and the **Greater yellow headed Vulture**.




Figure 6 When walking on the River Cabin trail you are greeted by a friendly giant.

Morning Hikes:

- Beechcraft trail

The introduction trail is full of surprises. A short walk that can turn into almost a half day. We spotted a **Three-toed Sloth** moving to nowhere. We also managed to spot the **Crested Owl**, hiding again in plain view. Its plumage resembles the dry leaves perfectly too. Sometimes we see a couple but this time it was just one. The **Little Cuckoo** was also spotted on an open spot and after several moments of patience we also saw the **Helmeted Pygmy Tyrant** and the **Ferruginous Backed Antbird**.

Afternoon trips:

Kabalebo river (Up and Down stream)

Even though Sandcreek is the place to be when it comes to photography and birding, we were limited this time. Impossible to even try, so we tried our luck both upstream and downstream of the Kabalebo river. As usual it was easy to spot the different Swallows like the White-banded Swallows and the White-winged Swallows. We also managed to see 4 out of 5 Kingfishers; the Ringed Kingfisher, the Amazon Kingfisher, the Green Kingfisher and Green-and-Rufous Kingfisher. Both the Crested and the Green Oropendola's were seen on different locations. Ospreys and Green Ibises never disappointed us either, seen continuously. The Cocoi Heron, Striated Heron and the Rufescent Tiger Heron were also seen and after a very long time I saw the Fasciated Tiger Heron. We also noticed a Giant Cowbird sitting on a Capybara's back. Sleeping Red Howler Monkeys were seen too and also both the Spectacled and the Smooth-fronted Caimans.




Figure 19 At the end of the day
